



A new Provincial Digital Library will expand access to academic research and openly licensed library resources. The first phase of the digital library will allow anytime, anywhere access to research created at B.C. post-secondary institutions, while the second phase will expand access to openly licensed resources across academic, school and public libraries.

THE CHALLENGE

British Columbia libraries, museums, archives, galleries and historical societies have been digitizing historical material for over a decade. At the request of Libraries Branch, Ministry of Education, BC, the following is an attempt to assemble an inventory of the institutions, materials and digitization methodologies that have been or are currently in use in BC. We provide recommendations for strategic integration and further development of shared services that may reduce costs and provide greater coordination across the knowledge. Further, the inventory serves to describe what might compose the extent of the currently available knowledge sector contribution to a "Provincial Digital Library".

- 85+ organizations in BC digitizing collections
- Over 32 different platforms
- 25 organizations either did not list a platform, or platforms were unidentifiable





Hub and Spoke Infrastructure

At a Steering Committee meeting in July 2016, the *hub and spoke model* was put forward as a best practice for the BCDL project. The hub and spoke model connects different organizations, in varying sizes and complexities, in a distributed network of content and service providers.



Phase 1: Demonstrate and Communicate

The BCDL is a phased, multi-year project, guided by an over-arching vision of access to the intellectual, historical and cultural record of the Province for the people of British Columbia. In its simplest form, the BCDL provides access to a range of materials that enrich the intellectual and leisure life of a citizen, showcase the contributions of individuals, organizations and government, and contribute to the economic well-being of the province.


